Miami to Georgia in One Second

After 3 youth suicides occurred in Lumpkin County, Rev. Frank Colladay called YES on behalf of the rural Ministerial Association of Dahlonega Georgia. Their concern led to our first visit and training effort for ministers and educators at North Georgia College & State University in April of 2000. Thus began a long-standing relationship and since then, yearly visits have provided YES training to students, faculty, and local residents.

Miami is 730 miles away from North Georgia. It usually takes a two hour flight and one and a half hour drive to get to Dahlonega and the NGCSU campus. This year our travel time will be minimized to one second - the time it takes our T1 Internet line to connect to the distance learning classroom at North Georgia.

Every Tuesday and Thursday beginning June 7, YES Institute will conduct the Gender Continuum, expanding our eight hour CEU workshop to a full 3 credit hour graduate course over eight weeks. The course will be offered to graduate students in the School of Education at both NGCSU and nearby Piedmont College.

Dr. Donna Waddel, Professor of Nursing at NGCSU, said; "we are developing a graduate level program for nurse educators. I would like to see this course approved by the Board of Regents and included in that program down the road."

We thank Jonathan Lewis, once again, for believing that education will make a difference in forging the social changes necessary to accomplish full equality for all youth. He backed his belief by issuing a \$50,000 challenge grant to YES to begin making distance learning a reality. Thanks to Jonathan and other supporters we have almost reached our goal (see page 3). When fully funded and implemented, the technology developed for this effort will be used with other courses. One of the first areas to be expanded will be innovative online courses for parents.

UM Med Students Open Up On Orientation

For the first time in the history of the University of Miami's medical program the medical issues, psychosocial beliefs, and physical realities impacting the health of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender patients was openly discussed. Virgilio Sklar met with the YES staff, asking that we facilitate the dialogue that was initiated by the American Medical Student Association (AMSA) and endorsed by the Senior Associate Dean of Medical Education.

Joseph Zolobczuk and Marie Ortiz led the discussion in an auditorium packed with medical students interested in learning about clinical and personal aspects of gender and sexual orientation. The inquisitive med students felt the conversation was long overdue.

Communication was quickly identified as an awkward area; how do we talk about these things, and what words do we use? Even simply, do you prefer to be called gay or homosexual? They questioned how to put gay patients at ease and make them feel comfortable enough to open up and share about their lives. We thank the young leaders of AMSA for their bold steps that have begun dismantling the long silence.

Gender Identity: Who Am I?

Miami is now the most diverse city in the United States. Fifty-nine percent of it's population is foreign born. Discordance over one's gender identity was introduced to future school and mental health counselors as another adaptive challenge for some youth. Joseph Zolobczuk led the discussion on gender in Dr. Diane Simon's FIU graduate class. The reactions showed the students were open and eager to learn about this emerging topic.

Middle Schools Opening Dialogue

The bell had rung, the kids had left, and spring break at Centennial Middle School had begun. The teachers buzzed around in the faculty lounge, laughing and talking about their plans for the weekend. The counselor who invited us to speak to the faculty said, 'You better make this very entertaining, because most of us are already on vacation and counting the minutes until we get to leave.'

It didn't seem like the ideal time to speak to middle school teachers about gender and orientation. However, ten minutes into our talk, hands started waving followed by a flurry of questions.

"How can you tell who is really gay or maybe just going through a trendy stage?. How much can we say and not have parents upset with us?." Several questions kept returning to one sticking point, revealing a commonly held misconception - that sexual orientation equates to sexual activity.

We reminded them that being harassed as "sissy" starts early in elementary school, long before kids even know what sex is. They were surprised to learn that the average age gay males report being aware of being gay and 'different', is five years old. Slowly the dialogue began to unravel many of their preconceived notions.

The focus moved and centered on how to make the school safer. Questions shifted to "what can we do?" and "how can we help?" A new clarity entered the room and with it renewed energy.

Everyone was fully engaged and as we were wrapping up, the faculty requested we return and provide additional training. We will return, but for now, it was time to go. Spring break had begun.

Opening Eyes and Changing Hearts

Seated side by side in a row, facing a classroom full of graduate students, two young panelists shared their life experiences with future counselors in Dr. Carol Clark's graduate human sexuality class at Carlos Albizu University (CAU). While most people would shudder at the idea of speaking to a crowd, Richard and Adrianna jumped at the chance. The counseling students were interested in understanding the concerns of our young panelists and their experiences in dealing with their families and schools, particularly as members of the Hispanic

community. The young speakers opened their hearts to the class and talked about the harassment they face in school and their everyday lives. When asked why they want to talk about something so painful, Richard responded, "What better way to open people's eyes to the life of a gay teenager?"

Statistics

Gay/Lesbian Youth:

- 33% of all teen suicides
- 50% rejected by their parents
- 28% high school drop-out rate

Heterosexual Youth:

- 80% of youth harassed "as gay" actually identify as heterosexual and are 5 times more likely to commit suicide
- 97% of all students hear anti-gay comments

Boys Trapped By Masculinity



Feeling their masculinity challenged, school shooters act out their frustrations using what they perceive as unquestioned strength - a loaded gun.

- 90% of school shootings involve boys taunted with anti-gay epithets
- Gay slurs and attacks on manhood have been part of all major school shootings
